If our righteousness (restored relationship with God) is by faith, what is the opposite of that?	
Why is faith in the work of Christ, h	narder than the alternative?

<u>Righteousness</u> means "to fulfill the demands of your relationship" A brief outline of why we need it, and how it works:

- 1) God in his grace, desires fellowship with us, a love relationship; in all of Creation, he desires this only with humankind
- 2) He established a covenant with the people of Israel
- 3) He promised to be their God and save them, and through them send Messiah, to be Savior of all who believe, not just Jews
- 4) The Jews promised to be his people and obey
- 5) They broke the covenant through sin and rebellion
- 6) Only the innocent party can re-establish the covenant; we cannot restore ourselves to a righteous posture, we depend on God for that
- 7) When sin comes, the Law is powerless to restore fellowship; the obedient person can no longer be considered righteous by God
- 8) Through Christ, God has now re-established the covenant relationship.

This restored relationship puts a two-fold demand on us:

- * that we admit our sin/failure repentance
- * that we accept restoration based on God's grace, not our merit faith
- 9) Relationship is restored with God and with the covenant community
