The Big Condition - Matthew 6:12, 14-15

As you meditate on the words of Jesus in Matt. 6:12, what is the main point?

In what way is Matt. 6:14-15 conditional? Does this seem fair? Does it appear that Jesus offers something, and then threatens to yank it back?

What establishes the basis of the condition?

The Greek word for confess is *homologeo* – it is derived from two words that mean 'same' and 'speak'. So when we confess our sins to the Lord, we are agreeing with him, saying the same thing about our sin that he would say.

In what areas of your life do you need to quit 'arguing' with God, agree with him, and call your sinful behavior what it really is?
